Next week we have the Halloween Fancy Dress day on Friday. Given the creativity I see in the school it will be interesting to see what transpires.


Once again, thank you for all the support as we strive to improve the school and please come to speak with me if you have any issues.

Year 4 - Vikings Topic

With great interest and excitement, the children in Year 4 Owls class this week presented their Viking projects that they have been working on at home. The children engaged in a 'personal project' for the past 6 weeks, choosing one aspect of the Vikings that interested them and from that they developed different crafts, models, pieces of art and poster presentations. As the children learned about the Vikings in their Topic lessons in class, they also learned research skills and how to find good information in books, on the Internet and by posing thoughtful questions. Year 4 also learned how to present their work orally by presenting themselves, speaking with a clear speaking voice, looking at the audience and speaking with confidence about their topic. Using all their new knowledge and research skills, the children were given the challenge of creating their own personal projects on the Vikings. And what a wonderful job they did! From Monday to Friday this week, each child had the opportunity to present their knowledge and understanding of the Vikings and, they certainly amazed each other with their creative and detailed projects. Model Viking boats made of clay and wood, Viking artwork, Viking bread; visual presentations and even a Viking long ship cake were shared with the class. Well done to all the Year 4 students for the enthusiastic way they have shared their learning this term!


